Frequently Asked Questions

- 1. Choose the type of operation you plan on creating
 - a. How many barrels?
 - b. Will you have a tasting room?
- 2. How will the project be funded?
 - a. Will you have outside investors?
 - b. Are there multiple founders?
- 3. Form a business entity
 - a. LLCs and corporations are the most popular choices.
 - b. Consult a business CPA for tax repercussions.
- 4. Capital Raising (if you will be utilizing investors)
 - a. Consult a securities attorney
- 5. Trademark your name
 - a. You can also begin trademarking beer names if you have them already.
- 6. Choose a location
 - a. Are you building from scratch? Are you utilizing an existing space?
 - b. Does the zoning allow your intended use?
 - c. Will you need a CUP?
 - d. Consult an architect or contractor you need to be sure that the space you plan to be using can accommodate a brewery.
- 7. Licensing
 - a. The state and federal TTB applications can generally be filed simultaneously.
- 8. Trademark beer names
- 9. Hire employees
 - a. Consult an HR or employment law professional.
- 10. Brew beer! This, my friends, is the fun part.
- 11. Price posting and label approvals (if you decide to bottle or can)

BEST PRACTICE:

"Consult a professional" is listed in the above steps more than once. When navigating unfamiliar waters it is almost always cheaper to pay for a consultation early in the process than it is to go it alone and risk costly fixes in the future.
